The following is an overview of steps to take when coming to worship at Trinity.


- RSVP at www.trinitydt.org and select which service you would like to attend. You may also call the church office at 713.224.0684 (8:30 a.m. 2:15 p.m., M-F) to reserve your ticket.
- RSVP early in the week to ensure you have a seat. (Online RSVP forms are only available up to midnight on the day prior to the service.)
- Attendees who have not RSVP'd for a worship service will be placed in a standby area in the gym (on Sunday) or outside under the porte cochere of the Education Center (on Saturday) until our volunteers can determine if there is sufficient seating capacity to accommodate them.
- No need to arrive early. To allow our volunteers and staff time to prepare our screening
 processes and help keep everyone safe, the entrances to the building will only be opened
 30 minutes before the scheduled beginning of the worship service. If you arrive sooner than
 30 minutes before the service starts, we would ask that you remain in your car until the doors
 are opened.
- Don't be late. We want our volunteers to be able to worship along with you, so the screening process will stop 15 minutes after the service starts.

We are happy to offer in-person worship services, but please do not feel obligated to attend, especially if you are in an "at risk" group (over 65 and/or have underlying health conditions). Please hear our affirmation that you are equally loved as part of our congregation. Livestream worship and on-demand worship opportunities will continue to be available.

Finance Corner - October 1, 2020

Dear Supporter of Trinity's Ministry:

Well, it's officially Fall. The temperature is starting to moderate (very slowly, of course), and there are lots of "new beginnings." Parents and their kids are beginning to adjust to their new "COVID-safe" school or college routine, and we are blessed to welcome Haley Davisson as Trinity's new Director of Youth and Children's Ministries.

Despite all of the changes that COVID has brought to our community, thanks to your continued generosity, Trinity's financial position remains solid. Although August's tithes and offerings were substantially below our monthly budget our year to date revenue remains on budget. Our operational expenses in August were 17% less than our budget, and for the whole year expenses are 8% lower than projected. This is mainly due to outreach activities not being conducted as originally envisioned, lower Sunday School expenses, and lower facility-related expenses. And, of course, the scheduled operational debt payments and "Asset Replacement Fund" process continues as planned.

For your convenience, please remember that you can track your contributions and/or print contribution statements online by logging into your Trinity Community Builder ("TCB") account. Just go to the "\$" on the left-most panel on the screen. Select it, and you will see your contributions listed in detail. If you then select the "Giving Statements" options on the top right portion of the screen, you can print your contribution statement.

Your faithful contributions continue to make a real difference in Trinity's ability to joyfully share Christ's saving love with all people, now. Thank you for giving as God has called us to give—generously and with a joyful heart!

I'm So Grateful for Stephen Ministry!

By a man who received care from a Stephen Minister

Fourteen months ago, I was at a point where I needed someone to talk to about the struggles in my life. My pastor recommended I consider meeting with a Stephen Minister—another man, trained as a caregiver, who would walk with me during this difficult time. Trusting someone with personal information about my life was something I feared at first, but my pastor reassured me that everything was confidential, so I agreed to give it a try. I'm so glad I did!

Soon after meeting my Stephen Minister, I quickly sensed I could trust him. Part of that trust came from knowing he was trained to help people through their problems. He made me feel comfortable by not prying for information, but instead just letting me share what was on my mind.

Any questions he did ask fit our conversation appropriately. Probably the best thing he did for me was not judging me for my past decisions; rather, he was there to help me move forward.

I think another significant trust-building factor was being able to talk with someone who was not in my regular circle of friends. My friends certainly continued to have a very important place in my life, but I also needed someone who could see me objectively.



Stephen Ministry is a way congregations can provide high-quality care and outreach to hurting people in the congregation and community.

Stephen Ministers are congregation members who have gone through 50 hours of training to provide one-to-one, Christ-centered care. Each Stephen Minister is matched with a hurting person—men are paired with men, women with women—and meets weekly with that person to listen, care, pray, and encourage.

Stephen Ministers care for those dealing with grief, divorce, job loss, hospitalization, financial struggles, loneliness, convalescence, terminal illness, and many other life difficulties.

That helped make it easier to share personal parts of my life. Also, knowing my Stephen Minister would be there for me "next week" (we usually met for an hour each week) gave me

confidence. I see now how much I needed regular encouragement as I rode the roller coaster of emotions that came during this period of instability in my life.

I really appreciated our times together. Our weekly visits were more than just meeting to talk. They also helped keep me accountable between times, to carry through with the changes I said I wanted to

make. My Stephen Minister often went out of his way to help me in my struggle.

My life experience during the 10 months I met with my Stephen Minister was not always one of progress. It took courage for me to honestly share when I had my failures and setbacks too. Even then my Stephen Minister was there for me. He encouraged me not to give up, but to pick up and keep going forward.

That genuine acceptance spoke to me the most; not to accept failure, but to confess, turn, and receive forgiveness. Having someone assure me of that biblical truth was really encouraging and was exactly what I needed.

My Stephen Minister walked with me through a really dark part of my life, pointing me to the truth and love that is in Christ. I thank the Lord for my Stephen Minister who did not try to solve all my problems but lovingly, as a Christian brother, walked along with me through this valley in my life.



If you are dealing with some type of crisis or difficulty in life, I encourage you to meet with a Stephen Minister. You won't regret it!





Greetings from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis!

Progress has been made. Stephanie and I finally have direction for entry into the UK and even tickets for a flight from Houston to London. It's not quite what we were hoping for – the regular student visa that would allow us the full 9-10 months to live and study in England – but it gets us there for the most important portion. We will enter with a six-month visa, allowing us to be in country for the first two of three terms. Two out of three ain't bad, right?

The third term – Easter term – is just for preparing for exams and cleaning up papers to be submitted, anyway. Or so we've been told. Although it's not ideal in our minds, we find a silver lining and are thankful to the Lord that we are able to proceed despite the pandemic which continues to dominate most of our lives. No doubt the next few weeks will be busy, probably stressful, and perhaps a bit confusing as we navigate quarantine in a foreign country while attending virtual classes and hoping that all the required reading is available online!

The late start of classes in Cambridge and the early return to the US has allowed me to spend some time with my classmates at the seminary, especially those in my Winkel. I'm sure I've mentioned this before, but

here's a quick refresher: a Winkel is sort of like a small group. Four to five guys intentionally put together so that we contrast (and hopefully complement) each other's personalities. The Winkel system is meant to mimic the circuit system of pastors and deaconesses out in parishes. Winkel is the German word for corner (think the corner of a room), so the group is made up of ministers from one little corner of the world. There's no telling who you will be around, but you're supposed to get together on a regular basis to learn from each other and encourage one another. Sometimes it works well. Sometimes it doesn't. Pastors are sinners, too!

But I've been blessed with a great Winkel. We respect and challenge each other so that we can grow to be the best ministers for the congregations we will serve in the future. We have even grown to include our wives in most get-togethers, so that we grow together as a family. I will miss these brothers and sisters while I am in England, but I'll be back in time to celebrate call day with them and their graduation. In the meantime, there will be plenty of work to keep Stephanie and me busy.

In terms of classes we will take, we were advised to plan our courses around the dissertation (what we would call a thesis here) that we produce at the end of this program. As of now, I am thinking of focusing on the issues of post-modernism or nihilism and how the Church properly understands and addresses these cultural shifts. I have chosen courses in philosophy of doctrine, ethics, the Gospel & Western culture, and patterns of Christian worship. It seems pretty intimidating, but I'm excited to learn and grow. I pray this experience will better prepare me to engage a world that is hostile to God's Word – to His forgiveness and reconciliation – despite needing it desperately.

I'm sure there will be plenty to reflect on once the classes begin. But until then, I thought I would share some thoughts that have been on my mind lately. I mentioned the burden of the news and politics in my last update. Since then, I listened to the audiobook *Hate, Inc.* which posits that all major news outlets (esp. on TV) have become mere peddlers of a product. That product is what we call "the news." It is designed first and foremost to make money. In order to do this, it gets you to watch/listen/ read their content as much as possible. And there's a lot of possibility in the 24-hour news cycle these days.

The idea is that these media outlets have so much competition and the bottom-line has become so much of a driving force, that actually informing people is no longer a priority. Even if they were aiming to inform us, we don't need a constant stream of knowledge of what is going on in the world. It simply

provides a false sense of control but forces you to keep coming back so that you feel like you're truly informed. But to do this, they don't challenge you. Instead, you are fed exactly what you want to hear and trained to hate anyone who thinks differently than you.

I know I've brought up the issue of formation in the Christian faith several times before. But this experience has really brought it home. Even when we tell ourselves that we are staying informed, we are being formed by a force that we probably don't recognize. It is helpful to be able to step back from the 24-hour news cycle and rest in the Word of God – the Word of grace and life and peace. Not simply as a brief break, but as a different way of life. Christians are supposed to be in the world but not of the world. We are supposed to be different. But that is incredibly difficult if we short-circuit the formation by the Spirit to chase after other gods.

The phrase "less is more" has perhaps become some sort of self-help platitude. I can recognize the value of it in the Christian life: giving up many of the things that our neighbors and coworkers value on a daily or weekly basis in order to pursue a knowledge of God's Word and of those real people around us. Connecting with people on a personal basis and not simply talking about community while we isolate ourselves to indulge in our private pursuits. This would be great for the life of the Church.


But it's hard. We get set in our ways. We get formed in the ways of the world. We get tired at the end of the day and don't want to teach our children. We get tired at the end of the week and don't want to go to church to receive God's gifts. We get tired and don't want to fight the pressure of the culture that tells us to give up on telling people about Jesus and His great love for them. We get tired and we start to lose focus of what that love looks like in our own lives and what it could look like in the lives of others.

But the Spirit keeps moving. He keeps calling people to repentance and faith. He keeps bringing people to the baptismal font and the altar to receive the forgiveness of their sins. He keeps giving out the peace of God in Christ Jesus the Lord. And we as the Church continue to be blessed by our gracious God and Father. We continue to be formed by the Spirit to trust Jesus and to speak to His world. We continue to be renewed and sent into our vocations for the sake of this world which is our Father's creation.

I encourage you to reflect on your own formation by the various forces in this world that would distract you from the love of Jesus. It may be the news, or it may be shopping on Amazon. I'm not saying you can't enjoy these things. But live a life of reflection. Be discerning. When you see improper formation – love for and reliance on things as rivals to God – repent. Turn to Jesus and find rest in your true home – the kingdom of God – where your attention isn't the basis for the bottom-line of an annual budget. Instead, it's drawn to the One who died and rose again for you so that you would live with Him forever.

"Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the

wisdom of the world? [...] but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men." (1 Cor. 1:21, 23-25, ESV)


